








- $\square$  Credits are awarded for a <u>passing grade</u> at the end of each semester Semester Course = .5 credit Full year course = 1.0 credit
- A failing Fall semester grade <u>CAN</u> bridge with a passing spring semester grade to average a 70 or higher for full credit.
- A Spring semester failing grade <u>CANNOT</u> bridge with a passing Fall semester grade. Students <u>MUST</u> pass the spring semester with a 70 or higher.
- Excessive absences (EA) (8 absences in fall, approx. 9 absences in spring)
  - ☐ No credit earned for an EA
  - Will need to speak with AP about making up the time



- ☐ The Yearly average is an average of the Fall and Spring Semester grades.
- Students MUST pass the Spring semester of the course.
- A student that passes both semester will receive full credit

### Exit

A grade <u>below 70</u> at the grading period (report card) <u>or below</u> <u>75 at semester</u> At the progress report grading period, a parent can request a level drop from an advanced course by providing a letter/email directly to teacher.

**STEM** - Science, Technology, Engineering, and advanced Math

<u>Business & Industry</u> - Information Technology, database management, marketing, accounting, finance, graphic design, construction, welding, automotive technology, agriculture, hospitality & tourism (culinary arts)

<u>Public Service</u> - Health Science occupations, education, human services (child guidance, cosmetology), JROTC

Arts and Humanities - Political science, literature, world languages, cultural studies, history, fine arts (Art, Dance, Music, & Theatre)

Multidisciplinary - Provides students the opportunity to take a variety of courses from each of the other four endorsement areas

### <u>Distinguished Level of Achievement and</u> <u>Performance Acknowledgements</u>

A student must earn Distinguished Level of Achievement to be eligible for the top 10% automatic admission program which requires:

4 credits in math, including Algebra II

4 credits in science

All Foundation High School Program requirements

At least one endorsement

A student may earn a performance acknowledgment for outstanding performance in the areas of:

Dual Credit

Bilingual/Biliteracy

College Board (AP) exams

PSAT, ACT, Aspire, SAT or ACT performance

Nationally or internationally Recognized Business or Industry Certification or License

### EOC: End of Course Tests

Retest opportunities are given in December of each year.

A student must pass all 5 EOC tests to receive a diploma and participate in the graduation ceremony

#### **SPRING COURSE SELECTION PROCESS**



9th graders in PACE/PACE PLUS will review 4-year plan created in Xello and make changes for the 2024/2025 school year. Counselors will review with individual students and select alternates during a guidance lesson in April 2024.

#### 2024-2025 PROCESS FOR CHANGING COURSE SELECTIONS

For 9th graders, students will have an opportunity to view course selections and make changes for 2024-25 school year.

In April, a Google Form will be available in HAC (the Home Access Center). The form is sent to parents for final review and changes. Please review selections in April and make any changes before the last day in April. Teachers are hired and the master schedule is set based on spring course selection choices.

Reminders about AP and Dual Credit



What if I would like to move from L-level to K-level? You can move during the first week of your 10<sup>th</sup> grade year if you have an 85 end-of-year average in the previous L-level course.

Can I still change my elective class?
The only time a student can change any elective or course is during the registration period which ends on the last day of school. In the fall, there are no course changes. We adhere to the district guidelines in the 23-24 Course Description booklet on page 5.

What is a prerequisite, and how does it affect my plan? You must check the prerequisite for each class you put on your 4-year plan. A prerequisite is a class you must have credit for BEFORE you take that class.

FAQ's

#### How do I drop from K-level to L-level?

You must **submit** a parent request at progress report or report card and give the letter to your teacher, and your average must be less than an 80. There are deadlines, so speak to your counselor or teacher if you are considering this option.

#### How do I know what classes are offered K level?

The CFISD High School Course Description Book has a list of advanced-level course offerings on page 7.

# When does my child take the EPC tests needed to graduate? Yes, you must pass 5 tests called End of Course (EOC). 9<sup>th</sup> grade: Algebra, English I and Biology 10<sup>th</sup> grade: English II 11<sup>th</sup> grade: US History

FAQ's

What if I have to make up a credit? What are my options? You will have to attend summer school, take a class online (CFISD accepts Texas Tech ISD, UT, or TXVSN), take a Credit By Exam test and score a 70 (\$31 fee) for each semester of credit, or attend Adult High School through Houston Community College.

Do I need service hours to graduate?
No, but they are highly valued by colleges and post-secondary training programs.
