MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT

We are the best school district in the state because we offer each of our students the opportunities they need to be personally successful.

Our academics prepare our students for their careers or for their chosen higher education institutions. Every imaginable cocurricular and extra-curricular activity is available. Athletics for both boys and girls for any sport they might want is offered. Technology that prepares our students to operate effectively in the workplace and in higher education is a part of every day. And for the fifth year in a row, we are one of the top three districts in the State according to the Education Resource Group (ERG). The ERG looks at the academic and financial performance of the 200 largest districts in the state. Their productivity rating measures academic achievement and operating efficiency based on all funded expenditures.

In our 78th year, we will open our 12th full-service high school, Bridgeland High School, and two elementary schools, Pre-K through 5th grade at Wells Elementary and, in a new model, Pre-K through 2nd at Hoover Elementary. Hoover's across the street partner, the existing Jowell Elementary, will provide education opportunities for 3rd-5th graders. This year, almost 116,000 students in 91 facilities will call CFISD home.



ENROLLMENT & DEMOGRAPHICS

CFISD continues to grow by approximately **1,000 students** each year, and is expected to **surpass 116,000 students** enrolled in 2017-2018. The district is the **third-largest in the state** and **22nd-largest in the nation.**

According to district demographer Population and Survey Analysts (PASA), CFISD ranks second out of 61 Houston Metro area school districts for the most housing starts in the first quarter of 2017. New home closings have increased by 17 percent in CFISD, while the cumulative Houston Metro area decreased by 4 percent.

Approximately 17% of CFISD's 186 square miles remain undeveloped.

FACILITIES

School construction is **booming** in 2017, as CFISD continues to make **efficient use** of taxpayer-approved **bond funds**.







The district expands to **91 schools and special program facilities** with the opening of Bridgeland HS (No. 12) and Wells ES (No. 55) in the educational village in the Bridgeland community, as well as Hoover ES (No. 56), an early-childhood focus campus relieving Jowell ES.



The Matzke ES replacement campus also opened in August, providing a gorgeous and spacious home to a school that had outgrown its previous design.

A new cold food storage warehouse near Cypress Woods HS will relieve space and transportation for the food service department.

Major renovations at Watkins and Dean MS and Adam and Bane ES will allow students and staff at aging campuses to feel as though they have brand-new homes an 2017-2018.

In addition to renovating tracks and grounds at several high schools, the athletics department opened a brand-new natatorium near Pridgeon Stadium this summer. The first-class facility will allow for more meet flexibility and easier access for a greater number of school swim teams.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

The community programs department served more than 5,800 students through its before- and after-school program, Club Rewind, in the 2016-2017 school year.



FOUNDATION FOUNDATION

The Cy-Fair Educational Foundation continues to generously support CFISD graduates and teachers with scholarships and staff development grants. Through events such as the Salute to the Stars Gala, Houston Methodist Cy-Hoops Invitational and BF Adam Golf Classic, the CFEF awarded \$447,000 in scholarships to 105 students in 2017.



COMMUNICATION

The communication team keeps the community up to date through resources such as the CFISD app (30,000-plus downloads), SchoolMessenger notification service (nearly 300,000 subscribers), website (23 million-plus pageviews) and social media (more than 60,000 combined followers).

Bond funds have allowed for new security cameras, card access and construction of new vestibules with bullet-resistant glazing at all campus sites. New fire alarms and public address systems will continue to be installed at several campuses.

TECHNOLOGY



Nearly **7,000 Hovercams**, more than **3,000 Promethean** panels and more than **3,800 Light Speed systems** help enhance the educational experience throughout the district.



The district's three data centers host 95 physical and 210 virtual servers with 1.2 PB of data storage. More than 17,000 CFISD email accounts and 150,000-plus network Microsoft and Google accounts are in operation.



CFISD's information services team processed **593,000** report cards and **383,387 payroll checks** in 2016-2017.

The eighth annual Technology Festival showcased 1,000 student projects to 3,700 guests last April, and the annual Digital Learning Conference in July allowed nearly 1,000 educators to enhance instruction with technology.



CFISD's technology team prepares students and staff for the ever-changing world. More than **200** 21st-century classrooms boast brand-new devices and equipment in 2017-2018.








STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

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
The Texas Education Agency (TEA) awarded CFISD the highest possible rating of *Met Standard* for the fifth straight year in its annual accountability ratings in August.



The 2017 STAAR assessments resulted in high passing numbers for CFISD as compared to state averages (see chart below).



CFISD is taking college readiness to another level with a **College Academy** pilot program with Lone Star College—CyFair in 2017-2018 at Cypress Lakes HS. The program will allow students who earn diplomas in 2021 to **graduate** with an associate degree from LSC-CyFair.





More than 17,000 students took advantage of AP courses in 2016-2017, while

more than 6,000 earned dual credit college hours.

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FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY



Despite further decreases in state funding, CFISD passed a budget in June allowing for a **competitive** teacher salary and staff raises. The budget passed with a proposed 2017-2018 tax rate that will remain **unchanged** for yet another year.





CFISD's Board continues to preserve a 20-percent local homestead exemption that gives taxpayers a discount simply for living in the district.
