



## GROWTH

- 117,307 = student enrollment on Oct. 29, 2021
- 9,312 = new students during the last 10 years
- 92 campuses (56 elementary schools, 19 middle schools, 12 high schools, 5 special program facilities)
- 40 new schools built since 2000 (23 elementary schools, 9 middle schools, 6 high schools, 2 special program facilities)
- 54 campuses at least 20 years old
- 3<sup>rd</sup> largest district in Texas; 2<sup>nd</sup> largest district in Region 4; 21<sup>st</sup> largest district in the nation (*Niche.com* 2021)
- 17,036 first-time students in 2020-2021 (7,635 in grades 1-12; 9,401 in kindergarten, pre-kindergarten & early education)

## PARTNERSHIPS

## BUSINESS AND FINANCE

- Tax rate:
  - Total tax rate of \$1.3392 for 2021, \$1.3555 for 2020; \$1.37 for 2019; \$1.44 for 2018
  - Maintenance & Operations (M&O) Tax rate at \$1.50, the maximum allowed by law, from 2002 through 2005; reduced from \$1.50 to \$1.354 in 2006; reduced to \$1.024 in 2007; increased to \$1.046 in 2008 and remained at \$1.046 throughout 2018; reduced to \$0.97 in 2019, reduced to .9555 in 2020, and reduced to .9292 in 2021
- 20% Local Optional Homestead Exemption plus \$25,000 state exemption
- Bond referendums:
  - 2019: \$1.762 billion – the largest bond election in the district’s history
  - 2014 - \$1.209 billion; 2007 - \$806 million; 2004 - \$713.2 million
- Administrative expenditures account for only 1.8% of the operating budget; Among the lowest administrative cost ratio (3.67%) in the Gulf Coast region for more than a decade and one of the lowest in the state
  - Operating cost is \$9,356 per student
- Accomplishments:
  - Association of School Business Officials (ASBO) Certificate of Excellence in Financial Reporting for the past 26 years

- Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) Certificate of Excellence in Financial Reporting for the past 25 years
- Fitch, Standard & Poor's, and Moody's bond ratings are AA
- Texas Comptroller's Leadership Circle Awards for financial transparency:
  - Highest possible distinction for all six years of program: "Platinum" (2014-2015); "Gold" (2010-2013)
  - "Superior Achievement" Schools FIRST (Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas) rating for 19 consecutive years
- Five-star rating for nine consecutive years for the Texas Smart Schools Initiative (formerly Financial Allocation Study for Texas, FAST)

- Class of 2021:
  - 9,139 graduates

- Academics:
  - Every student in the district received a Chromebook

- Athletics:

  - Cypress Creek girls basketball competed in the state championship game
  - Six swimmers earned gold, silver, or bronze medals, and 11 others placed in the top 15 at the UIL Swimming and Diving Class 6A State Meet
  - Cypress Woods boys set a new state record and won the state championship in the 200-freestyle relay
  - Four Bridgeland students competed at the UIL State Tennis Championship
  - Cypress Creek boys' golf team finished 12<sup>th</sup> at the UIL Boys' Golf State Championship
  - Cypress Ranch wrestler Jayden Bazemore was the state champion in the girls' 128 lb. category
  - Five former and current students participated in the 2020 Tokyo Olympics and Paralympics
  - Cypress Ranch graduates Colton Cowser and Ty Madden were selected among the top 32 in the MLB Draft
