



GOAL

• To involve members of the Cypress-Fairbanks community in evaluating the need for, and the scope of, a bond issue.



Committee Purpose

- evaluate input and needs in identified areas
- develop consensus for a long-range plan recommendation
- present recommendation to the Board of Trustees



Charge

Through this process, the committee will develop a long-range plan recommendation that:

- considers the educational needs of students.
- provides a solution for the facility, technology and transportation needs brought on by the district's growth.
- ensures support for a quality education for all students.
- reflects community values and perceptions of needs.
- includes a projection through 2020 for facility needs and renovations, security modifications, technology infrastructure improvements, and transportation needs.
- is fiscally sound.

Parameters

- Consideration given to all needs before establishing priorities.
- Evaluate and prioritize needs based on the established goal and charge of the process.
- Bond elections may only be held on one of two approved elections days (general election day May or November).



Committee Structure

- Chairmanship
 - · Committee Chair Debbie Blackshear
 - Committee Liaisons Teresa Hull, Roy Sprague, and Stuart Snow
- Comprised of approximately 50 members
- Includes parent, staff, business/community members and students
- Reflects the geographic and demographic diversity of district




Student Enrollment



Texas Student Enrollment








Private School Enrollment, CFISD

 - to have every campus achieve Met Standard






Financial Success




Cypress-Fairbanks ISD is ranked the number one school district in the state by the Educational Resource Group (ERG) for academic and financial performance.

Process	Time Line
• LRPC will discuss results of previous bonds and growth needs, including campuses and transportation.	January 9, 2014
• LRPC will discuss technology needs.	January 14, 2014 VISION 2020 Long-range plan

Process	Time Line
• LRPC will discuss security needs and facilities assessment reports and major projects proposed.	January 16, 2014
• LRPC will discuss tax and financial information and determine scope and possible scenarios for bond.	January 22, 2014

Process	Time Line
• LRPC will reevaluate proposed scenarios. Vote on long-range plan to present to the Board of Trustees.	January 29, 2014
• TBD	February 4, 2014
• TBD	February 6, 2014

Process	Time Line
• Present long-range plan to the Board of Trustees.	February 13, 2014
Board of Trustees considers calling a bond election.	February 27, 2014

 Develop informational materials and conduct meetings to educate public about bond study process and proposed issue.* 	March - May, 2014
 Hold Bond Election* *Will ONLY occur if a bond issue is called by the Board of Trustees 	May 10, 2014
